# **Environmental Science 2017-18 Course Syllabus**

# A. Linwood Holton Governor's School

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## **Course Description**

This course explores the role of humans in the environment with an emphasis on sustainable solutions to environmental problems. During this course, students will be challenged to use their new knowledge of natural systems to create solutions for current environmental issues. Topics will include ecological systems, populations, environmental health, sustainable farming, biodiversity, climate issues, water use and pollution, conventional and sustainable energy, waste issues, and environmental economics. This course will also discuss the unique and wonderful natural resources in our Appalachian region.

This asynchronous online course will help students strengthen their independent study skills and time management skills. It is also the instructor's goal to teach students to read and write scientific texts. This course is designed to cultivate an appreciation for the natural world and to promote scientific problem solving skills.

This class is a dual enrollment course and 6 college credits will be awarded upon successful completion of the course. College credits are offered through one of four community colleges based on the location of the high school the student attends. The four community colleges that may be awarding the credit are Mountain Empire Community College, Southwest Virginia Community College, Virginia Highlands Community College, and Wytheville Community College. Announcements: Check your ALHGS email and Blackboard daily for any updates.

<u>Course Pacing</u>: Assignments and related information will be organized into weekly units. Units will become available on Fridays and will culminate with a unit test the following Friday. All due dates will be clearly marked on each assignment. Daily participation in the Blackboard discussion forum is an expectation. Unit pacing and Friday tests will be adjusted for school holidays as needed.

<u>Attendance and make-up work</u>: You are expected to participate in all activities and submit all assignments by their due dates. The attendance policies and expectations of your home high school are to be followed.

In the event that an absence will prevent you from taking a test or submitting an assignment on time, email the instructor as soon as you are aware of the conflict. Make up tests or adjusted assignment deadlines will be coordinated by the instructor and the proctor at your home high school.
